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## PRINCIPAL REPORT

*“our dedicated staff have worked seamlessly together to ensure the success and support of the students” ...*

This week, students had the opportunity to raise funds for 'Shoes for Planet Earth' through the Frost Learning Team day. This is a not for profit organisation that collects shoes and donations for people in South Africa so that underprivileged people have the opportunity to participate fully in life, free of soil dwelling disease and hygiene issues whilst also having access to improved health and wellbeing. The student leadership team raised an amazing \$1,010.30 for Ciara's wish. Ciara is the younger sister of Year 12 student Riley who, following a fall in a netball game, was diagnosed with an inoperable brain tumour. As always, through these activities, students will be impacted in their own lives as well as contributing to lives in our wider global community.

There were significant events in the life of the College and our dedicated staff have worked seamlessly together to ensure the success and support of the students. The Year 12 Formal is a highlight in the calendar and students enjoyed a welcome break from their studies and exam preparation. It was a positive and well-organised celebration and Semester 1 certificates were awarded for Academic Excellence, Resilience and Perseverance and Respect and Integrity. Our Year 12 Coordinators Mr Gavin Watson and Ms Stella Dikeos are to be congratulated for their work in providing this wonderful opportunity for our students to share .

It was an evening of musical delight as over 70 students took part in the College's Semester One Music Concert this week. The music ranged from classical through to contemporary. Congratulations to the very talented music students who showcased their progress in the Instrumental Music Program and to the students involved in the Symphonic Band, Intermediate Concert Band, Stage Band, Guitar Ensemble and Vocal Ensemble. Thank you to Mr Michael Couche and the Music Staff, it was a fabulous evening enjoyed by all.



I have met with local primary principals and the positive relationships we have with our feeder schools and the hard work of staff in providing Grade 5 and 6 students a positive introduction to secondary school through the Kick Start Program, assist in providing a robust transition program. We have welcomed 16 new students into the College and our students have started Semester 2 classes with students and staff receiving their new timetables. Our Timetabler Mrs Anna Firth has done a great job ensuring our timetables were ready to go.

Berwick College is recognised for the provision of rich and varied pathways for all students. There is significant preparation underway for students and parents to be prepared for the 2019 course counselling process which commences early next term. I recently signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Casey Tech School and our Tech School Champions, Mr Ian Venables and Mr Brendan Allen are very pleased with the opportunities this will bring for our students in preparing for careers in the Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Maths (STEAM) industries.

I have been very pleased with our students' approach to their exams and assessments. Assessment forms part of a road map indicating where a student currently is in their learning. Staff support students to the next point in their learning journey through discussion with students, collaboration with staff in professional learning teams and parents. The introduction of Compass has provided parents with a snap shot of student assessment results in OnDemand Testing and the Victorian Curriculum. NAPLAN results will be available next term. Staff are currently finalising reports for our students which are a reflection and summary of their learning and our teaching. Reports will be available online on Friday 20th July.

## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT CONTINUED...

Our staff are continually striving to engage all our students in learning activities that are likely to result in achieving meaningful learning outcomes. Year 9 LOTE students video conferenced our Bridge partnership school SMA Lokon Indonesia to practise their language skills, develop friendships and build cross-cultural understanding.

Days have been filled with competitions and excursions such as: Cardinia Chess Tournament, Division Cross Country, Year 8 sport, hiking camps, Parliament tour, Market Day, Cathedral Ranges, galleries, Holocaust Museum and Federation Uni. Two staff and 19 students had a rewarding learning experience on the Central Australia Tour and members of our Dance Academy and staff are currently on tour in New York. The academies have had outstanding success thanks to the hard work and dedication of the staff. The Dance Academy achieved four Gold medals, four Silver, a Bronze, fourth, fifth and sixth place at the Dance Star Finals. The Basketball Academy had five teams qualify for the Junior State Championships. Our Division 1 Boys team were undefeated, winning back to back State Championships and the Division 2 Boys A team also winning a State Title. The Division 1 Girls had a strong finish placing third in the State.

Our students and our school are doing so well, and I am very grateful for the hard work and dedication of our staff. Teachers work many unseen hours, and then give up their own time for the extra curricular activities that happen in the evenings, on weekends, lunchtimes and after school. This week the College Council acknowledged with thanks, Mr Russell Kealey who goes on leave until the end of the year and at that time, will have completed 20 years of Teaching Service in the area of Media and Humanities, to the College.

None of our success would happen if it wasn't for staff passion and generosity. Thank you to all our school councilors and Assistant Principals for their hard work for the first half of the year and thank you to you, the parents, carers and families of our young people.

Our students learned about survival in our harsh Australian Outback and about the culture of our First Nations People who make this region their home.


Whilst in the Watarrka National Park they worked tirelessly to protect ancient river red gums from the invasive weed Buffel Grass which has spread, threatening their existence should a fire break out. This back breaking work was embraced by the students and staff who were determined to protect these beautiful trees, some of which date back 400 years. On most days students hiked between 15km and 25km to experience some of the worlds most spectacular hikes, coming home to snuggle in their swags and sleep under the stars, each one with new knowledge of the stars and the cosmos.

To be part of the community at Lilla and to be welcomed by elders into this special place is truly a gift. To be able to share in the worlds oldest living culture and to understand the Tjukurpa (Creation stories) that underpin this culture is something that our students will carry with them forever. Students have expressed that they feel changed by the experience.

We are so proud of our students, so proud of the way in which they represented our school and our community and would like to congratulate them all on such an amazing effort. Well done Berwick Mob.




## LOTE—INDONESIAN






## STRUCTURED WORK PLACEMENT – FLEXIBLE LEARNING & VCAL STUDENTS – YEARS 10, 11 12

### VET BUILDING & CONSTRUCTION

One of the more popular VET courses held at Berwick College is Certificate II in Building and Construction. This year saw a new first year program introduced with new resources purchased for the student's use.

**Second year students** are building a cubby house, which will double as a storage/garden shed. Building a structure is part of the second year's assessment tasks. The cubby house will be 2.4 metres long, 1.8 metres wide and 2.1 metres in height, which will then be cladded. The structure will have a skillion (angled) roof with a corrugated iron exterior. Early May the students started to piece together the walls and roof. This project will continue over Term 2 and into Term 3 with the completed cubby house to be auctioned on eBay. This will hopefully raise funds for the VET building and construction area, to both service and purchase equipment for future students.

**First year students** have been working on constructing a toolbox.

This week the task was to create inserts to divide the sections of their toolbox. Students will use multiple tools in the workshop such as hammers, nail punch, a drop saw and power sander to complete their project.

**Operation Newstart addresses the needs of students at risk in the middle years of their secondary schooling.** Using a combination of experiential learning, wilderness therapy, family group work, mediation, counselling and community interconnectedness, our goal is to prevent students from disengaging prematurely from their families and schools and to prepare pathways to further education and employment. A key feature is small group work (maximum of 8 or 9 students) under the direction of highly skilled professionals who provide a multi-layered intervention focusing on the young person's relationship with self, family, school and community. Programs run for a full school term, with students attending their home school for two days each week, and the program for the remaining three days. *Taken from the Operation Newstart web site*



## CENTRAL AUSTRALIA

Three of our students (**Ceili Swords, Matthew Spencer and Jorja Green**) recently attended the Central Australia Camp. Jorja (7.7) wrote the following reflection on their amazing experience:

"At 6:00 am on Tuesday morning, we were at the airport waiting for our flight. When we got to central Australia we met our tour guide, Daria and we hopped on to the bus and headed to the Desert Wildlife Park to check out some of the animals that we may run into on our trip. Then we went to a reptile center to learn about snake safety, watched a crocodile show and held some lizards.

Once we were done at the reptile center we went to our first campsite called the earth sanctuary. At the sanctuary they only run on reused resources like power from solar panels. We had to sleep in swags outside in -3 degrees. The toilets were also 3 minutes' walk away. Our group of 20 students did some star gazing the day before we left for Lilla, the aboriginal community which was a 5 hour bus ride away.

When we arrived at Lilla, we were greeted by three adorable dogs, Rocky, Blacky and Buster. We set up our swags in our tents and went on a walk to see the sacred water holes. Over the next few days at Lilla we went on two hikes. The first one was 4.5 km and the other walk we did before we left. It was the Kings Canyon walk that was 6.6 km hike that was very hard because there were many cliffs and rocks we had to climb. We also went on another hike, the Valley of the Winds, it was very cold that day and very windy.

On the 5th day we went to Uluru which was a 3 and a half hour trip. On the way we stopped at a camel farm and we got to ride a camel! Then we kept driving, and finally we made it to our campsite, which was really nice with a shed for us to eat in. On our last day we did the full base walk of Uluru which was a 10 km walk before we hopped onto our plane and flew home."
