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## PRINCIPAL REPORT

*“This year to date, students have raised \$10,000 for 10 different charities, actively making a positive difference in the lives of others.”*

It is my pleasure to inform our school community that Berwick College is a **Victorian Education Excellence Award (VEEA) finalist in the Outstanding Secondary Teacher category for 2018**. We are very proud to recognise the achievements of Excellence in Learning Leader, Mrs Cassandra Marinopoulos for outstanding dedication in building the skills and knowledge of staff to improve student-learning outcomes and demonstrating quality teaching, the use of data and evidence informed strategies to monitor learning growth of students.

We were delighted to see the positive changes in student learning evidenced through the excellent results achieved in NAPLAN, particularly in the area of Numeracy. We know it is important that students develop key skills such as literacy and numeracy to help them through school work and life. Our Strategic Plan targets have been exceeded. The results correlate much more closely with our Year 12 results and the participation rate was outstanding.

As part of their Service Learning Project students participate in Homegroup activities to earn points for their learning team and promote awareness of a charity that delivers social benefits for the community. This year to date, students have raised \$10,000 for 10 different charities, actively making a positive difference in the lives of others.

Last week the Flynn ‘Rock Your Socks Off’ competition was held in the Stadium, with gold coin donation for the Watarrka Foundation who have commenced construction of a secondary school building. It was terrific to know that we are contributing to making education available for students in need. Together with the risotto Master Chef competition, these fun activities were a demonstration of the talent of our students. The ladder results are closely monitored by staff and students, and together with the points gained from our Carnivals and Learning Team days held thus far this year, the Kenny Learning Team holds first position, closely followed by Chisholm then Hollows and O’Donoghue.

Over the past few weeks, I have attended the two VET Dance performances, which were outstanding, the Presentation Night to celebrate Semester 1 academic achievement and the Junior Band Performance. Staff time in planning for these experiences is considerable but these enable our students to further their learning, reinforce achievement of outcomes and social skills development.

I gratefully accepted cheques to the amount of \$8,000 from **The Rotary Club of Berwick** at their Changeover meeting on Wednesday 5th September. These funds from the Presentation Balls will contribute to the permanent shade structure over our assembly area and we are grateful for their partnership with us in educating and inspiring the young people of Casey to succeed and have a positive impact on their community.

On the weekend, I attended the State Schools Spectacular. It is wonderful to see our young performers on stage with the best in the State and my thanks to the staff who have supported the students in being part of this special event.

This week, 112 Year 10 students will gain valuable learning experiences in their structured workplace learning as part of the Game of Life curriculum. Some of the placements were in education, retail, veterinary, legal firm, administration, childcare, butcher, pharmaceutical research, medical and carpentry. We are grateful for this partnership with employers which ensures that young people have the opportunity to develop an insight into the skills and attitude required by business and to raise awareness of future career opportunities. The diligence of our careers team is much appreciated in the liaising with students and businesses and ensuring all the OH&S and DET requirements are completed. Thank you also to staff who visited these students at the workplace or called to check on their progress.

Significant preparation and support is being provided to our Year 12 students who are preparing for their exams. They attended an Elevate seminar to assist them in improving their study techniques and participated in a motivational workshop with ex-AFL player Simon Black. TSSM exam revision classes are held in the holidays with highly qualified teachers that have been or are examiners, reviewers or publishers and trial exams will be conducted on Wednesday 10th October. Year 12 students finish their formal schooling on 23rd October, with VCAL students mostly finishing their work by the end of this term or very early in term four.

We look forward to meeting a good majority of our school community at the Parent/Teacher interviews to be held this week on Thursday evening and Friday.



## FROM OUR NURSE—YEAR 10 IMMUNISATION




If your child is in YEAR 10 and you would like your child to be immunised for Meningococcal and did not take up the offer to do so in May, please email me and I will forward you the consent form for you to complete and also forward the Immunisation Schedule. We have **already** had the day for this immunisation at our school, however this is offered again to our students in **YEAR 10 ONLY**.

Meningococcal is caused by bacteria. Although meningococcal disease is uncommon, it can become very serious, very quickly. About 10 per cent of people carry the meningococcal bacteria in their throat without becoming unwell. These people are known as "carriers" meningococcal bacteria are passed from person to person by regular, close, prolonged household and intimate contact. Adolescents are at increased risk of meningococcal disease and more likely to spread the disease to others.

There are different strains of the meningococcal bacteria known by letters of the alphabet, including the meningococcal A,B,C,W and Y. In recent years the meningococcal W strain has increased across Australia, with Victoria experiencing 48 cases in 2016, compared to 17 cases in 2015, four in 2014 and one in 2013. It is now the predominant strain in Victoria.

# ROMEO AND JULIET PLAY REVIEW



On Wednesday the 29th of August, the two Year 9 HAP classes travelled to the Melbourne Arts Centre to watch a live performance of Shakespeare's *Romeo and Juliet* to enhance our study of the play in our English class. Intended for an audience of school students like us, the play helped improve our understanding of Shakespeare's language and the plot, presenting the characters and storyline in a unique adaptation.


After meeting at Berwick Station at 7:45am, classes 9.5 and 9.6 took the train to the city. Unfortunately, there were train delays which caused us to arrive about 20 minutes late for the performance. Despite arriving late, we only missed the very beginning of the play. We all sat in the very back rows at the top of the theatre, which provided a good view of the stage below.

The stage adaptation of *Romeo and Juliet* received mixed reactions from the Year 9 students. We all agreed that the performers' theatricality was very effective in expressing the plot and characters; in particular, Mercutio's actor seemed to be the favourite for his dramatic portrayal of the energetic character. The performance was also praised for its use of set props such as colourful lights and a grand balcony-like platform, which added to the dramatic nature of the play. Additionally, we thought that the actors delivered their lines admirably with appropriate expression, demonstrating their understanding of Shakespeare's language.

On the other hand, we felt that the play was inconsistent at times. The costumes were criticised for lacking continuity and some characters seemed to lack development over the course of the play. Some students thought that the performance didn't "flow" very smoothly between scenes, which affected the storytelling. We also noticed that some dialogue was left out and some people thought this made it difficult to follow the story.

After about an hour and a half, the performance came to a close and all the actors returned to the stage for a bow. Other than a handful of flaws, we felt that the performance was highly enjoyable because it brought Shakespeare's story to life in a way that was genuinely entertaining. At lunchtime, we all went to Melbourne Central and spent the next hour and a half eating lunch, going shopping and recounting our thoughts on the play. **Sarah Powh**


