
# **Introducing Berwick Colleges latest Head Start Sign ups**


Congratulations to **Joshua Stania and Mitchell Bennett** who both signed up to a Head Start Apprenticeship in Cabinet Making and Carpentry respectively during March 2021 after successfully completing work trials.

**Joshua Stania** initially undertook a trial as a carpenter with a local building company but found that the job wasn't really what he expected.

He was provided with a opportunity to look at alternative wood trades and it was suggested that Cabinet Making would offer the same opportunity to work with timber, however it would allow for Josh to demonstrate and draw from his creative side a little more, and allow him to develop the fine work and finishing skills he was looking for.

Success at school and at work, as well as demonstrating





Mitchell knew that he wanted to work in a hands-on industry. He wanted to achieve a trade qualification and have a job with a variety of skills involved.

Mitchell went out and sourced the employer himself and provided Monaghan Homes with information about Head Start and the opportunities it provided. Mitchell has now commenced as a Head Start Apprentice after completing a six week trial.

During Mitchell's apprenticeship he will undertake his Certificate III in Carpentry with onsite assessment.

Mitchell is the first apprentice that Monaghan Homes has employed. Monaghan Homes' staff are impressed by Mitchell's strong work ethic and attitude towards his chosen career. Well done Mitchell.

# S.T.E.A.M Team

The last few weeks has seen the STEAM team joining up to different competitions and challenges and then starting the process of finding team members and assigning group roles. I have been very impressed with our students who are showing great resilience and patience in making sure that they are listening to everybody's ideas.

Our Subs in Schools and F1 in Schools groups have started to come up with fundraising ideas to purchase the equipment that they will need and their registration fee which is all a part of the journey that this challenge takes them on. Our Subs in Schools Team were making mini prototypes of submarines out of straws, Blu-tack and polystyrene cups to explore buoyancy.

Our First Lego League Team have been working hard together as a team to understand the Spike Lego robot and the programming that it comes with so that they can start making Spike move and do different tasks. I am very impressed to share how amazing the Video Game group have been over the last few weeks in trying to come up with and incorporate ideas on how to include the theme of scale. We have teams using the programs Scratch, Unity 3D and Unreal to make their creations.

Our Camera Obscura Team have jumped leaps and bounds over the last few weeks and have formed a tight, well-oiled team. They have gone through the process of finding possible areas in the school, permission to use this room, as well as a prototype of a scaled-down version to understand the mechanics. They were looking at the pinhole image, which lets light in through a small opening on one side and projects a reversed and inverted image on the other.

Our Hydroponics team have done an awesome job researching what they wanted the system to look like and what types of materials like pipes, types of plants, pumps etc. that they will need. The team is now up to sourcing materials and costing. The team have been able to find connections who can supply them with some plants and also different shapes of piping. Our Green Space Team have sourced tyres and are in the process of figuring out where in the school these would go, what plants would go in them and what they will look like.


Our Arduino group have been busy at work learning how to code, put together Arduino boards and all of the parts that go with it. This team is amazing in how they each help each other when they get stuck and offer ideas and suggestions. They are currently trying to locate an RFID reader to add to their design. Our STEAMpunk mural group have started the design process which includes mosaic pieces and different materials such as keyboard letters, nails, cogs and old bicycle wheels to make each letter of STEAM.

We have had other mini challenges over the last few weeks including a group taking apart a computer and putting it back together. We also have a student working on a stopmotion using playdoh and modelling clay as well as other students working on Lego projects and the aerodynamics of paper planes.

Our awesome STEAM iFly Excursion has been changed to next term on the 29<sup>th</sup> of April.

At the moment we are coming up with ideas for the name for our STEAM Team. Ideas such as STEAMSpace, STEAMScape,

**STEAM** Machines STEAM Rollers have been voted as the favourites. We are also looking forward to having the "new logo for STEAM" competition in the upcoming weeks. If any student missed sign ups and is very interested, please come and see Miss Arney in A20.





# VCAL Numeracy —Scones in the making

Recently in VCAL Numeracy, students successfully baked scones. This links into multiple aspects of Numeracy, such as finance (costing the ingredients), numerical skills (determining ratios for quantities of ingredients), measurement and design (measuring the ingredients out correctly) and planning and organising (following all instructions correctly considering time management.)







# YEAR 9 FLEXIBLE LEARNING

The year 9 Flexible Learning class has been participating in a unit on Sustainability and Australian Outdoor Environments throughout Term One. The students have participated in a range of outdoor experiences including snorkelling at Flinders Pier, surfing at Phillip Island, orienteering at Emerald Lake and conducting sustainability analyses on the grounds of Berwick College and the Melbourne CBD.

During these experiences students have had an opportunity to experience a range of outdoor environments including sea grass beds, coastal zones, intertidal flats, dry eucalypt forests, riparian wetlands, and urban man-made environments.

For each ecosystem the students have been able to identify and explain examples of native and introduced flora and fauna. Students have explained how current land practices contribute to climate change and land degradation, and also identified how these actions can be mitigated through application of conservation strategies, green energy principles and green building design.

Students also participated in a guided tour on sustainability in the city, identifying and learning about green building design examples which included examples of retro-fitting solar panels, water tanks, cross-flow ventilation, green spaces and a variety of clean energy applications.













# Careers Education—Year 9

Year 9 students will complete their **Career Action Plan** during Terms 2 and 3. During these sessions students will complete a Career Action Plan which includes goal setting and clarifying actions related to occupations they have identified using the Berwick College Careers page/Career Tools, including an initial investigation into education and training pathways. These sessions support students with their choices at course counselling later in the year regarding programs and subjects.

# **Careers Education**

#### Year 12

During Term 1 Year 12 students have participated in a post-secondary careers transition session, which has included completing a Career Action Plan (CAP) via Webex on a Wednesday after school. This prepares students for their second careers education session in Term 3. During the second session, students will receive support applying to their preferred institute and/or workplace. This is an integral part of the Year 12 transition from secondary school to further education, training or the workplace and involves identifying any necessary requirements to enter institutions or organisations related to each student's preferred career choice. These requirements may include Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank (ATAR) and pre-requisite subjects/study scores required for entry into university courses, as well as any necessary external tests, interviews, portfolios, auditions or other requirements.

#### Year 11

During Terms 2 and 3, Year 11 students will complete their Career Action Plan (CAP) in class to support their in school and post school pathways related to their preferred career choices. These sessions will support students with their choices at course counselling later in the year regarding programs and subjects.

#### Year 10

Year 10 students have completed their Career Action Plan during class time throughout Term 1. These sessions support students with their choices at course counselling later in the year regarding programs and subjects.

volunteered their time to ensure this breakfast was a success. We appreciate it, more than you know!








# Year 7 Camp




