### Strong connections with our wider community

Hockey Facilities, all which students enjoy today. **Mr Andrew Ellis,** (pictured right), a Berwick resident kindly donated photography equipment, **R&A Concreting** kindly donated a table tennis table and classroom items (pictured right) for a wellbeing program and Woolworths Berwick donated boxes of Lego for our numeracy classes. **The Rotary Club of Berwick,** a wonderful partner to our school, has run our Presentation Balls and has told us we will receive a sizeable donation again this year. We appreciate every single investment in our students and College which assists us to provide the best in learning and wellbeing.

My thanks to the FROST Learning Team, Mr Brandon Reeve and Mr Stefan Maksic, for organising the Frost Learning Team Day to raise funds for Dolly's Dream. Dolly's Dream is committed to changing the culture of bullying by addressing the impact of bullying, anxiety, depression and youth suicide through education and direct support to young people and families.

College Council ratified an updated Mobile & Digital Technology — Student Acceptable Use Agreement policy on Tuesday, 20th June and this is available on Compass, the website, and an excerpt on page 20 of this newsletter. In accordance with the Department's Mobile Phones Policy issued by the Minister for Education, personal mobile phones must not be used at Berwick College during school hours, including lunchtime and recess, unless an exemption has been granted. Where a student has been granted an exemption, the student must use their mobile phone for the purpose for which the exemption was granted, and in a safe, ethical and responsible manner. I have recently spoken to our year 7 girls regarding the inappropriate use of technology to bully or harass another person. Students will face a number of consequences for serious or repeated offences, in accordance with



the College's ICARE values and Handbook and Department of Education guidelines. Safe and responsible behaviour is explicitly taught at Berwick College and parents/carers are asked to reinforce this behaviour at home. The <u>eSafety Commissioner</u>, has excellent resources and guidance for young people and parents on their website.

### **Student learning**

Year 11 and 12 Vocational Major students have completed two weeks of work experience, and year 10 students will complete their work experience next term. The year 12 formal was a highlight for students and staff, Basketball students have competed in the VCC Junior State Finals; Dance Academy students competed in their Choreographic competition, and we have had students enjoying a variety of outdoor education activities and regional sport competitions which have enhanced the learning and extra-curricular experiences for our students. Twenty-two students from our Dance Academy and staff have departed on the New York Dance Study Tour and will return on Thursday 29th June. The two music concerts last week showcased the talents of instrumental students; a testimony to their hard work and diligent practice.

My thanks to the Senior School team for their commitment and flexibility in managing the logistics of year 10 and 11 exams, which followed VCAA protocols, so they are well prepared for their exams, and the General Achievement Test (GAT) which assessed student skills against the new literacy and numeracy standards.

We are always striving for improvement to get the best possible outcomes for each of our students. Semester 2 timetables reflect a rich and varied curriculum and varied pathways available for students. Our 2024 Junior and Senior Curriculum Guides are available on the <u>website</u> for families to review in preparation for the comprehensive course counselling processes for students and parents early in Term 3.

To mention some 'housekeeping' and while we reflect on our achievements, we would also like to remind everyone of the expectations that the college has regarding uniform. It is crucial that all students adhere to the College's uniform policy and that Chisholm students maintain the highest level of standards. This means being in full uniform at all times. Failure to comply without reasonable communication from home may result in you being placed in a separate program for the day. Uniform not only provides equity among students but, more importantly, ensures their safety. We need to be able to identify all students and distinguish them from intruders. Your uniform plays a vital role in maintaining a secure learning environment. With winter setting in, it's important to note that hoodies and non-uniform items will be removed and held until the end of the day, with possible parent pick-up. Non-compliance with these requests will not be accepted, and a staged response will be put in place to address the issue. If you and your family require any support regarding uniform items, now is the time to seek assistance.

While it is our expectation that all Chisholm students are already in full uniform, we understand that circumstances may arise and we are here to support if we can. If you need uniform items and don't have them currently, we urge you to make arrangements during the holidays to ensure you are fully prepared. In addition to the uniform policy, we would like to emphasize that backpacks are not permitted in classes. We have recently dealt with several incidents of damage to property caused by bags, which could have been easily prevented if students had simply refrained from taking bags to class. Please be aware that the school will not be liable for any damage to personal items, and such incidents may even become civil issues. Moreover, backpacks create an Occupational Health and Safety (OHS) trip hazard and are strictly prohibited in class. We kindly request all staff members to enforce this policy as it is non-negotiable.

As we move forward, let us continue to uphold the values and standards of the college and the Chisholm learning team.

Needless to say, everyone had a blast!






### MATHS AFTER-SCHOOL HELP SESSIONS—Tuesdays—A13

Students participated in an activity where they





It was a very big, cold day where the students behaved beautifully and remained engaged






