Every Day Counts – the importance of 95 percent attendance.

Going to school every day is the single most important part of your education. Students learn new things at school every day – missing school puts them behind.

School is better when you are here.

Why is attendance important?

We all want our students to get a great education, and the building blocks for a great education begin with students coming to school each and every day. Students develop good habits by going to school every day – habits that are necessary to succeed after school, whether in the workplace or in further study. Missing school can have a big impact on students academically and socially. It can affect their test results, and just as importantly, it can affect their relationships with other students, and lead to social isolation.

There is no safe number of days for missing school — each day you miss puts you behind, and can affect your educational outcomes. Each missed day is associated with falling behind in subject topics and assessment tasks, and lead to fewer subject choices and may impact on achievement in years 11 and 12 and post-school pathways.

Ninety Five Percent Attendance

At Berwick College our research shows that students who have an attendance rate of 95% or greater are expected to be able to achieve expected learning growth. Those who have an attendance rate of less than 95% are less likely to make expected learning growth. This works out as no more than two days absent per term.

Congratulations to the 787 students who achieved 95 percent attendance throughout February/March.

You have started 2024 off the right way and are on track to make expected learning growth based on your attendance.

Safe Collection of Students

YEARS 7 TO 11

Berwick College has a duty of care to ensure the safe collection of students from school or a school activity.

If necessary, during school hours, parents may collect their child from the Front Administration office or authorise an emergency contact (recorded on CASES 21/Compass). Both the adult's name and reason for the collection must be entered on the Compass Attendance module or can be emailed to attendance@berwickcollege.vic.edu.au.

If a parent requires a non-emergency contact to collect a child, written permission must be provided and verification of identity using suitable photo identification (such as a driver's licence) must be signed by school staff prior to pick up.

YEAR 12 STUDENTS

Year 12 students are required to remain on College grounds between their first and last scheduled class. Students are encouraged not to leave College grounds at any time during the day and are expected to spend their study periods studying in one of the allocated spaces within the College, Senior School Centre or Library where there is teacher supervision and support available.

Year 12 students leaving College grounds independently during the day must:

- Provide written parent consent (either handwritten or via email to the attendance officer/s: attendance@berwickcollege.vic.edu.au) or via parent consent on the Compass Attendance module.
- Sign out from the Front Administration Office.

International Women's Day—STEM Experience

Friday 8th March saw some of our selected year 11 and 12 students venture to The Department of Defence for International Women's Day. This event showcased the variety of STEM careers available in Defence Science and Technology. It provided our students an insight into how STEM professionals work to support Australia's Defence and Sovereign capabilities.

There was the valuable opportunity to have one-on-one discussions with STEM professionals to discuss their experiences and lifestyle. A tour of the Defence Science and Technology Group base to see the facilities and capability provided to support researchers in Defence STEM careers was also part of this special experience.

Students enjoyed the tour of the research facilities which gave them the opportunity to view equipment up close, an opportunity that is not normally open or accessible to the public. Some of the equipment on display included:

- Maritime: Operating in the maritime space with advanced undersea surveillance, materials science, and navigation technologies.
- Platforms: Making sure our vehicles are undetectable, resilient, efficient, and capable. Chemical, biological, radiological, and nuclear: Detecting threats and protecting our forces in compromised environments.
- Human and Decision Sciences: Support of human situational awareness, decision making, control, and protection in complex environments.

Students were also given the opportunity to ask questions of a panel of female researchers and professionals from the Defence Science and Technology Group.

Year 12 student, **Ira Sabet**, couldn't speak more highly of the event. "I never realised how many job opportunities were available to me. The Defence Forces will pay for your university degree and give you paid work in the forces whilst you are studying."

Ira also mentioned how amazing it was to see how bombs were detected and blown up using technology, as well as seeing how American Air Force Carriers were dismantled and rebuilt.

Berwick College was the only government school represented on

the day, which included 40 female students from all over Victoria.

Our College prides itself on giving our students every opportunity to gain access to the very many options that are available for school leavers.

As you may be aware, the Mobile Phones - Student Use policy for Victorian government schools came into effect in Term 1 2020. This policy requires students to switch their phones off and securely store them during the school day.

The policy is designed to support teaching and learning, promoting learning environments that are free from unnecessary distractions. The policy also aims to increase physical activity and socialisation at recess and lunch times. A review of the effectiveness of this policy found that it has reduced the use of mobile phones during school hours, with a range of benefits noted by principals and teachers.


The Department of Education has also published a parent/carer support page on mobile phones in schools on its website. This website includes links to supports for parents/carers on safe and responsible technology use at home.

Airforce Defence 2024—The sky is the limit!

Just before the end of the school year, our budding pilots, **Jett Lacey** and **Maxwell Monteith** travelled to the RAAF Base Point Cook which is the birthplace of the Australian Flying Corps and the Royal Australian Air Force. Point Cook was established in March, 1913, as the location for the Central Flying School and has the oldest continually operating military airfield in the Southern Hemisphere. Here, they participated in a program specifically for young people of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander heritage aged 15-18.





The students participated in a variety of activities that demonstrate the

different options that are available for future careers in the Royal Australian Air Force. This Work Experience program was designed to give participants an exposure to what a potential career in the military would look like.

This dynamic program included an overview of the roles available within the RAAF as well as practical activities such as:

- Physical Training
- Weapons demonstrations
- Tour of the facilities and RAAF museum
- Team & Leadership skills

- Drills
- Information sessions about recruitment process
- Lunch was provided in the Mess.

Both Jett and Maxwell thoroughly enjoyed the day and had the excitement of trying out the simulated cockpit used for pilot training.

Student Engagement

Term 1 has started and finished with such momentum that Christmas seems like a distant memory. Behind the scenes, our teachers, leaders and staff have all been working tirelessly to ensure that we create an engaging, accountable and positive student-centred environment. We would like to express our gratitude for all the work and effort that the College staff and students put into every day.

This year we introduced student planners and these are being used well by most students to assist their daily organisation. Many students are using them as communication tools between home and school or using them for permission slips to leave class. We encourage students to keep up the good work in remembering to bring these to class.

As a school, we have a renewed focus on high expectations for one another and positive routines that support learning, including 'Ready to Learn' competitions and start of class procedures.

'Ready to Learn' (RTL) has encouraged students to work towards earning points for their learning teams by completing simple, daily expectations in order to build consistency across the College. The initial 'RTL' points were focussed on attending class on time and we would like to congratulate the O'Donoghue Learning Team for being clear winners on the first occasion. Our second cycle of RTL has been 'prepared for class' (which included all required materials). As of this article, we have not announced a winner as the results are still being collated.

We would like to thank the students and staff for the way in which they have adopted this new initiative and the positive nature it generates each day.

Positive routines have been another key focus for the school, with staff paying particular attention to two main areas including: homegroup routines (including landing patterns and attendance) and orderly learning before entering the classroom (including lining up, being greeted at the door and being invited into the classroom).

We would like to remind parents and students that school attendance is vital to the academic growth of students. Current modelling suggests that students with 95-100% attendance will give themselves the best opportunity to obtain one year's academic growth. In contrast, if a student has 80% attendance across the year, this is equal to approximately one day off per week.

REMINDER UPCOMING VCE-VM STRUCTURED WORKPLACE LEARNING

All students aged 15 years and over undertaking the year 11 and year 12 Vocational Major Program are required to participate in Structured Workplace Learning as a part of their Vocational Studies. 




Dance Academy News

Road Safety (removal of School Crossing Supervisors at Manuka Road & Princes Highway) and Cyber Safety

PEDESTRIAN OPERATED SIGNALS



The City of Casey regularly reviews its school crossing service to identify improvement opportunities to benefit Casey's growing community and Council staff. While the crossings are operated by Council, the rules around how they operate are set by the Road Safety Act (1986) and apply to all crossings across the State.

Under the State Government's School Crossing Subsidy Program, and to meet the VicRoads standards for the management of a school crossing supervisor at pedestrian operated signals, it must cross more than 20 primary school children both morning and afternoon to qualify as a designated crossing site.

On major roads where working traffic lights already exist, the Road Safety Act (1986) lends no authority for School Crossing Supervisors to stop or direct traffic. Research shows that at these sites, pedestrian operated signals provide the highest level of safety for pedestrians when used correctly.

Following recent pedestrian counts at pedestrian operated signals located on Clyde Road, Princes Highway and O'Shea Road all in Berwick as well as Frawley Road in Hallam, these locations do not qualify for a School Crossing Supervisor. School Crossings Supervisors will no longer operate at these locations from the beginning of term 2, 2024.

While there will no longer be a Crossing Supervisor at the site, we encourage the community to use the existing pedestrian lights as the safest point to cross the road in that location. To assist students and the school community through this change, we encourage you to view and share the VicRoads educational video on the importance of using pedestrian operated signals correctly. You can view the video at https://www.youtubs.com/watch?ape=desktop&y=B-Tc0X-9_Xw.

Please share this information, the video and attached flyer with your school community to ensure anyone that uses these pedestrian operated signals are aware of the removal of school crossing supervisors and how to cross the road safely.

In addition, we have a range of educational information that can be located at safe-around-schools and share with your school community addressing a range of road safety matters.

The City of Casey will continue to advocate to the State Government for reduced speed zones, better pedestrian sequencing (time allowed for pedestrians to cross an intersection) as well as red and speed light cameras where there are large numbers of school student pedestrians.

Tips for Walking to School



- At every road crossing practice Stop, Look, Listen & Think
- before you cross the road.
- Discuss road rules in simple terms
- Teach your children road safety and navigation skills by riding or walking around your neighbourhood together
- Find some walking buddles.
- Chat with other families about setting up buddy groups of younger and older children who can walk together.

Safely crossing at pedestrian lights

Pedestrians must always obey the signals when crossing at traffic lights. When crossing remember:

- . When you come to pedestrian lights, stop, press the button and wait.
- Begin crossing once you see the green man signal.
- Check that all traffic is stopping before starting to cross
- Stay alert look and listen for traffic while crossing.
- If the flashing red man signal starts while crossing, don't worry, continue crossing.
- . Do not start to cross on the red man signal, even if it is flashing.
- Walk bikes and scooters across the crossing. Always hold balls when crossing the road, never bounce them across the road.

Pedestrians are not allowed to:

- cross the road if they are facing a red pedestrian light.
- cross the road within 20 metres of a pedestrian crossing they must use the crossing

My child is involved in an online safety incident — what can I do?

As a parent or carer, you know your child better than anyone and have the best opportunity to guide them to have positive online experiences. If your child has been involved in an online incident (as a target, instigator or bystander), it is important that you work together with the school to provide your child with the support they need. It can be distressing to learn that your child is being cyberbullied, has been exposed to inappropriate content or is using technology inappropriately but it is important to focus on their wellbeing. It's best to not engage with the incident online - instead, stay calm, positive and focused on finding solutions

When an online safety incident occurs, school staff will work through an incident response procedure, which is underpinned by school policies, education department/sector guidelines (if applicable) or eSafety advice. Ask your school for a copy of the procedure and familiarise yourself with the response steps. If you have an issue with the school, make sure that you raise it through the appropriate complaint procedures

Check in regularly with your child and the contact person at your school. Regardless of whether your child was the target, instigator or bystander in the incident, it is likely that they will require emotional support. If your child has used technology inappropriately, support them to take responsibility for their actions and give them ideas to resolve

If you feel your child is in immediate danger or at risk of harm, call Triple Zero (000) and stay with them until they are safe. Seek professional help if your child is distressed or shows changes in behaviour or moods, remembering that Ipline and Beyond Blue can help. Maintain contact with the school so you can work together to support your child.

Make a list of questions that you want to discuss with your child's school and use this to guide conversation. Check if your child has questions as well, or if they have any ideas on how to resolve the issue or repair the harm. Throughout the process it is important that communications with your child's school are calm and positive, fo on addressing the issues and supporting your child. You might like to ask the school to watch out for concerning behaviours, or discuss the strategies that will be implemented if the issue remains unresolved. Keep in regular contact with the school, making set times to meet with your child's teacher, school counsellor and, if needed, the principal or school wellbeing team. This may help support the wellbeing of your child particularly if you have concerns with the steps taken in managing the issue, or if your child starts to feel uncomfortable about attending school. Bull Way! also has helpful advice on how you can work together with schools to address and resolve bullying issues.

Your child's school and their GP or health professional can provide support. Draw on your own support network too, and make sure to seek help for yourself if you need it. The eSafety website includes a list of o services that can help anyone involved in an online safety incident. This list can be filtered by audience (including parents), the type of support required, issue and state/territory.

eSafety has a range of information for Parents and Carers including skills and advice to help you talk to your child about online safety issues including cyberbullying, online pornography, sending nudes and online gaming.
