Nevertheless, while the Victorian Government supplies most of the school's funding, Berwick College is dependent on locally raised funds, in the form of parent or carer contributions, to supplement the government funding. The voluntary contributions are essential for the operation of the school's curriculum programs, the provision of specialist staff and additional equipment and resources.

In 2024, the locally raised funds supported the following initiatives:

- To upgrade student lockers and drinking stations
- To commence the student toilets, refresh project
- To roll out digital screens to every classroom
- To provide a wide range of programs and curriculum experiences
- To provide wellbeing programs and initiatives to support students.

We thank you for your support over previous years. This support has made significant difference to the school environment, student wellbeing and the extended learning programs we offer.

Payment arrangements and methods

Berwick College contributions are outlined in Compass payment portal for each student, requesting they be finalised by the due dates. Payment methods include Compass Portal (via Contributions tab), over the phone via credit card, cash via Administration Building, BPAY and CentrePay.

Financial Support for Families

Berwick College understands that some families may experience financial difficulty and offers a range of support options for Extra-Curricular activity payments, including:

- the Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF)
 - If you hold a means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF payments of \$250 per year
- Payment Plan (Berwick College will work with families to develop acceptable payment plans)
- State Schools Relief
- School Saving Bonus

Refunds

FREE INSTRUCTION

- Schools provide students with free instruction and ensure students have free access to all items, activities and services that are used by the school to fulfil the requirements of the Curriculum. This includes the Victorian Curriculum F-10, the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) including the VCE Vocational Major and the Victorian Pathways Certificate.
- Schools may invite parents to make a financial contribution to support the school.



PARENT PAYMENT REQUESTS

Schools can request contributions from parents under three categories:

Curriculum Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for curriculum items and activities which the school deems necessary for students to learn the Curriculum.

Other Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for non-curriculum items and activities that relate to the school's functions and objectives.

Extra-Curricular Items and Activities

Items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides for free to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis.

- Schools may also invite parents to supply or purchase educational items to use and own (e.g. textbooks, stationery, digital devices).



FINANCIAL HELP FOR FAMILIES

- Schools put in place financial hardship arrangements to support families who cannot pay for items or activities so that their child doesn't miss out.
- Schools have a nominated parent payment contact person(s) that parents can have a confidential discussion with regarding financial hardship arrangements.



SCHOOL PROCESSES

- Schools must obtain school council approval for their parent payment arrangements and publish all requests and communications for each year level on their school website for transparency.
